2014 in Review

On January 24th, 2015, Vancouver Island Regional Library staff members and the Board of Trustees convened for the 2015 Annual General Meeting. The “2014 Year in Review” and key performance indicators were presented, as well as a 2014 Finance report. The Board also welcomed 18 new trustees and elected new and standing members to the 2015 Executive Committee, Chair and Vice-Chair. In whole, 2014 marked a terrific year of programs geared towards staff and the community, with impacts that support both the strategic vision of the Board and the mandate of our library system.

In 2014, VIRL embarked on a series of projects that underpin its five-year Strategic Plan, approved by the Board in 2011. Now in its final year of deployment, VIRL reflects on the achievements of 2014 and looks forward to the new strategic planning operation taking place in 2015.

2014 Highlights

Vancouver Island Regional Library has executed its 5-year Strategic Plan (2011-2015) based on the pillars of Collection, Communications, Facilities and Operations, Information Technology and the Delivery of Quality Service. The Facts

- **81%**: “Libraries provide services hard to find elsewhere in the community.”
- **94%**: “A public library improves the quality of life in a community.”
- **95%**: “Libraries play an important role in giving everyone a chance to succeed.”
- **40%** of BC adults have difficulty reading a newspaper, filling out a work application form, reading a map, or understanding a lease.
- **1%** increase in literacy levels would raise Canada’s productivity by 2.5%, an estimated \$32 billion boost to our annual GDP.
- **WiFi** has become a hallmark of library service, with 98.7% of all service points around the province offering wireless Internet services. Demand for the service continues to rise exponentially – 50% since 2012 and 650% in the last five years.

Finance

Finance Report

Balance Sheet: The balance sheet of \$30.9 million shows a healthy balance of cash and investments.

Summary: While the year-end process requires further adjustments into the New Year, the current year position is sustainable.

Revenue and Expenditures: Significant items affecting the current position of \$946,126 include: Revenues were generally in line with expectations with the exception of draws on the reserves for projects that have now been rescheduled to 2015. Similarly expenditures were lower than expected due to the timelines for these projects being pushed back as well as some internal savings of wages and benefits.

Summary: Taking all items into account, VIRL's operations are in a good position and will complete the year in a more positive position than originally budgeted.

Reserves Report

The Board of Trustees is provided with updated Reserves information at each meeting. At the end of December, the reserves show a \$4.2 million balance. The only item drawn from reserves in 2014 has been for materials due to the opening of Nanaimo North facility in June, 2014.

Summary: The reserves are healthy and continuing to grow following draws in previous years due to large-scale project funding.

Facilities Update

North Cowichan/Chemainus: VIRL is awaiting further confirmation of the direction from North Cowichan.

Sooke/Juan de Fuca: VIRL is awaiting further confirmation from the Town of Sooke.

Sidney/North Saanich: VIRL currently is awaiting feedback from Sidney/North Saanich with respect to land provisions.

Campbell River: The Campbell River branch is currently being revitalized with internal branch improvements, including new paint and furniture, in 2015.

Nanaimo Harbourfront: The renovations of Nanaimo Harbourfront have been planned and are expected to begin in the spring, 2015.

Tofino: A feasibility study has been conducted and pre-planning is being considered.

Tahsis: VIRL is awaiting an engineering report be conducted of the current Tahsis branch. VIRL staff continues to develop a plan that blends the branch, books by mail and eLibrary resources into a viable solution for the Village of Tahsis community.

Port Hardy: The planning process has begun for the revitalization of the Port Hardy branch. A public consultation is being scheduled in the immediate future.
